#### READING AT PITTVILLE

One of our key foci this year has been to improve reading outcomes for students at Pittville. To achieve this, we've looked at how reading is taught across the curriculum; how we encourage reading for pleasure and how we use data to inform our interventions and monitor progress. There has been a wealth of activities and events across the year to support these initiatives. Just last week we were visited by local author Hayley Hoskins, whose latest book *The Whisperling Twins* is now available. We also held a spelling bee competition at lunchtime. Congratulations to Khadija Ahmad in Year 9 for her excellent spelling capabilities; a £20 Amazon voucher is now yours!

Interventions such as Lexia and Bedrock have resulted in students improving their reading age scores by sometimes years in the space of a few months! Certificates to recognise these achievements will be coming home with your child.

Teachers from across our broad range of subjects have found innovative ways to incorporate reading strategies into lessons. This has enabled students to receive

consistent exposure to reading across their daily timetable and help drive the progress we are seeing.

We have taken the entirety of Year 7 to Waterstones and to the local library this year. We've incorporated a class novel into tutor time, alongside comprehension questions and vocabulary, and have boosted our own library stock with new and exciting titles.

This summer, why not take a trip to the local library with your child to join the Gloucestershire Library's Summer Reading Challenge? Or pick up a good page-turner for them for your beach holiday? Or even read the same book as them so that you can compare your views afterwards. Taking time to read for pleasure is a key indicator of a child's future success. Gentle encouragement can reap great rewards. Happy reading!



## **RSHE - DROP DOWN DAYS**

This year Pittville School rolled out their new RSHE connected programme, which aligns tutor times, assemblies, and drop-down days on a half-termly basis to help students access different RSHE themes in an engaging and age-appropriate way.

Monday 8<sup>th</sup> July saw our final successful drop-down day of the year, on the theme of 'Awakened Mind, Bright Future.' Students across all stages experienced and enjoyed the following events and workshops:

Year 7 Enterprise Day, where they started the day with a talk from an entrepreneur and then, in small groups, designed and pitched their own product that could fit in a can.

Year 8 began to explore careers and engaged with the online careers' platform 'Unifrog' which allowed them to complete their own personal quizzes and career profiles. Students also learnt about job pathways with the organisation GROWS. Perhaps a highlight of the day was students getting their first experience of the Duke of Edinburgh

Award Scheme on our school field, putting up tents and trying their hand at first aid.

Year 9 students walked to the Cheltenham Children's Library to learn about the STEM themed summer reading challenge and volunteering opportunities. They also attended an online workshop with the British Heart Foundation and learnt about the issues of cannabis and vaping.

Year 10 were preparing for Work Experience with GROWs and a bespoke programme designed by our careers' coordinators, Ms Lawton and Mr Raistrick. This was an excellent way to prepare for an exciting week experiencing the world of work.

The PE department are proud to share with you our stand-out performances from the Cheltenham District Athletics meetings that have taken place over recent weeks. These are incredible events involving 4 different evenings with year 7, 8 and 9 competing at the highest levels. From Tewkesbury to Chipping Campden, Cotswold to Chosen Hill and all the secondary and grammar and private schools in the middle of Cheltenham. It really is something special.

In year 9 - Jo Edwards finishing second in the 100m this year.

Year 8 - Riley Lockey winning the year 8 long jump with a jump of 4 metres 77cm.

Rosie Sheerin winning the girls 200m final (a dead heat in 30.3 seconds)

Alexa Woodward - second in the 800m final.

And finally, Jack Shingler, smashing a record that has stood for 10 years. He won the 1500m in a time of 4 minutes 33s, a time that would currently put him in the top ten nationally. This was 15 seconds faster than the old record. Indeed, the whole stand,

parents, children, and staff applauded Jack, who gave the run of the evening and indeed the performance of the last 4 meetings.
